

**HAWAII REFINERY TASK FORCE**  
**Meeting Summary**  
**April 9, 2014**  
**2:00pm – 2:55pm**

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The final meeting of the Hawaii Refinery Task Force (HRTF) was convened at 2 p.m. on April 9, 2014 at the YWCA, Fullerton Hall.

Mr. Mark Glick, Vice Chair of the Task Force opened the meeting with a review of the Task Force accomplishments to date followed by a statement of objectives of and reviewed the agenda for the meeting.

ICF International presented an overview of the final report that had been sent to the members for comment. The report offered a set of options for helping to ensure a smooth transition toward the state's future energy ecosystem with respect to two key areas:

1. Maintaining access to and making improvements to critical fuels infrastructure, particularly the import infrastructure needed to sustain supply should one or both refineries close; and
2. Working to resolve several specific regulatory challenges that are having significant impacts on the refineries.

The *Final Report* provides updated estimates of the reductions in fossil fuel consumption resulting from conservation measures and fuel switching in both the power and transportation sectors, and provides estimates of total petroleum demand through 2020. The *Final Report* also addresses the need to Ensure Continuity of Hawaii's Fuel Supply and provided the following key infrastructure issues: access to existing infrastructure; Kalaeloa Barbers Point Harbor planning; fuel reserve; Hawaii gasoline specification; Pier 51 prioritization process; Jones Act; and energy assurance plans.

A brief overview of regulatory issues including Mercury and Air Toxics Standard (MATS), Federal Tier 3 Gasoline Specification, and State GHG Reduction Initiative was provided.

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Following the *Final Report* presentation by ICF, Director Lim opened the floor to comments from members. Blue Planet Foundation provided the following comments:

The Abercrombie Administration should consider the range of stakeholder views on this alternative approach as it makes a final determination of the state GHG rules. As it makes a final determination of the state GHG rules, the Administration should seek to reconcile its approach with the projected GHG reductions from HCEI, consider the range of stakeholder views on this subject, and ensure consistency with its response to the federal rulemaking process on existing power plants (i.e., Clean Air Act Section 111d).

There were no other comments from members.

Director Lim opened the floor to public comments. There were no public comments made.

Mr. Robin Campaniano motioned to adopt the report with the noted changes requested by Blue Planet Foundation. Mr. James Moonier seconded the motion.

The Final Report of the Hawaii Refinery Task Force was adopted by unanimous vote.

Director Lim provided final comments that while the *Final Report* concludes the formal work of the Task Force, further action will be required to refine and implement its recommendations. On behalf of Governor Abercrombie, Director Lim thanked the Task Force members and adjourned the Task Force.
