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NOTES:

The APC Permits are required by federal law under the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 United States Code Section 7401, et seq. Though the permit is required by federal law, administration of the permit is conducted by the state.

The first step for the applicant is to discern which type of Air Pollution Control (APC) is applicable for the proposed project. There are two different types of APC Permits, which are compared in the following table:

Covered Source Permit (CSP)	Noncovered Source Permit (NSP)
<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Includes major sources of air emissions and sources subject to a federal performance or control technology standard (see APC Instructions, pages 8-9 of 12 for a definition of “major sources”).- Described in HAR 11-60.1, Subchapter 5- Further described in Section 112 of the Clean Air Act.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Any stationary source constructed, modified, or relocated after March 20, 1972, that is not a covered source.- Described in HAR 11-60.1, Subchapter 4

If the proposed project is located in Haleakala National Park or Hawaii Volcanoes National Park a “Prevent Significant Deterioration (PSD) of air quality” is also required in conjunction with the APC Permit. These two areas have been designated as Class I areas, which have more strict requirements—only a small amount of new pollution is allowed in these areas.
